# Indicators at a Glance

# Real GDP by Industry

In 2015, Alberta's real GDP by industry fell by 4.0%, the largest drop among the provinces and the first decline in GDP since the 2009 global financial crisis. Nationally, real GDP grew by 0.9% in 2015, down from 2.5% in 2014.

# **Population**

Alberta's population was 4,252,879 as of July 1, 2016. This was an increase of 1.75% from the year prior. Canada's population grew 1.2% from a year ago.

# **Migration**

Net migration to Alberta was 10,302 in the second quarter of 2016. During this time, Alberta welcomed 12,467 net international migrants. However, there was a net outflow of interprovincial migrants (-2,165), the third consecutive quarterly decline.

# Employment<sup>1</sup>

Alberta gained 13,300 jobs in September. The gains were in full and part-time positions with large increase in the selfemployed. Goods sector employment increased (9,400) and the services added (3,900). Employment was down 2.0% year-over-year (y/y).

# Unemployment Rate<sup>1</sup>


Alberta's unemployment rate increased 0.1 percentage points to 8.5%. Canada's unemployment rate was steady at 7.0%.

# Rigs Drilling

Alberta's rigs drilling count averaged 80 active rigs in August, down 29% y/y with only 17 per cent of rigs in use. There were 121 active rigs drilling across the rest of Canada, down 30% y/y.

# Real GDP by Industry


Annual, % change



#### Inflation

The Alberta Consumer Price Index (CPI) rose 0.7% y/y in August. Rent was down 1.9% y/y. Gasoline prices were down 15% y/y. Excluding food and energy, inflation rose 1.4% y/y.

# Average Weekly Earnings<sup>1</sup>

Average weekly earnings (AWE) in Alberta increased 0.1% in July to \$1,119. Compared with the previous year, Alberta's AWE was down 1.6%. Canadian AWE rose 0.1% to \$955.

#### Retail Sales<sup>1</sup>

Alberta retail sales decreased 0.8% from June to total \$6.1 billion in July. Sales were down 3.8% y/y, continuing weakness over the past year and a half.

# **NEW:** Housing Starts<sup>1</sup>

Alberta housing starts increased to 28,907 (annualized) in September. Housing starts are down 22% y/y, driven by multi-family starts, down 35% y/y, and offset by a 5% y/y increase in single-family starts.

# **NEW:** Housing Price Index

Alberta's New Housing Price Index (NHPI) declined in August and is down 0.5% y/y. Calgary's NHPI was down 0.7% y/y and Edmonton's NHPI was down 0.2% y/y.

# **Building Permits<sup>1</sup>**


Alberta building permits rose 1.3% in August to \$1,008 million. Building permits were down 22% y/y and 23% year-to-date. Residential permits were down 27% y/y, and non-residential permits 15% y/y.


Monthly, CPI and AWE, year-over-year % change




# Real GDP by Industry (Basic Prices)

(2015, year-over-year growth)




# **Unemployment Rate**

(September 2016)




# Average Weekly Earnings

(July 2016, year-over-year growth)




## **CPI Inflation**

(August 2016, year-over-year growth)




### **Employment**
